As we move further into the recovery phase, it is vital that we use this time to support local retailers and entrepreneurs, while helping even the smallest businesses to lead sustainable projects and initiatives.

Finally, I would like to say a huge congratulations to Watford Football Club for their promotion back to the Premier League - it just goes to show how resilient Watford are, and like them we will soon be back on our feet and thriving!

### Focusing on development

### Why can't the council just say no?

Elected Mayor Peter Taylor reflects on the challenges faced by the council in the face of the high new homes target set by central government for Watford, which are similar to those of our much larger neighbouring boroughs.



In the three years since I've been in office, the issue that is raised with me time and again is development in the town. People are concerned about the number of new developments that they see and the developments in the pipeline that have been granted planning permission.

People are worried about high rise homes and whether our current infrastructure like transport, schools, roads and other facilities can support the rising population in the town.

No town stands still. Places evolve and that is the natural order of things. However, the rapid growth in Watford is a concern that I share and one which as a council we have very little control over.

### How the system works

Undoubtedly the UK has a chronic housing shortage. The government is under pressure to deliver new homes for people across the country. Watford residents want their adult children to have options to stay living in the town in the future, and I'd like to think that one day my own children will have that option too.

In light of the demand for homes, each council in the UK is set a housing target by central government.

There are two key factors that play a role in setting these targets: the average salary of residents and the average house price in a given area. If the house prices are deemed unaffordable when viewed against the average salary then that area is required to build more homes. The theory is that the cost of new homes will reduce once more are available.

This makes sense but what the calculation doesn't consider is the space available in the area. Watford is one of the smallest boroughs in the UK at just 8m<sup>2</sup> (21km<sup>2</sup>). We have so little land available to us for development. Most of the sites that developers invest in are small scale

and this drives the developer to build at volume - which means high rise homes.

Our neighbouring councils Three Rivers, Dacorum, Hertsmere and St Albans have similar housing targets to us but a lot more land available to them. This is primarily green belt which can only be built on in exceptional circumstances - they also have protected Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty which we all want to preserve for future generations.

All councils have a duty to cooperate when it comes to housing, so we have asked all our neighbouring authorities to take some of our housing growth because of our limited size and high housing target. So far, they have all said it's not possible but I will continue raise the issue and put forward Watford's case.

The calculation also fails to consider the demand for homes from outside of the town. In our case we are just outside premium property price territory London, and many people look to move from the city to Watford because we have so much to offer: commuter transport options, some of the best schools in

the country, brilliant facilities like our award-winning parks and theatres, employment options... I could go on. So there will always be demand for Watford homes, no matter how many we build.

#### Watford's target

Our target is currently set at 14,000 new homes over 18 years. Our planning team have evaluated all the sites in the town that have the potential for development - these are included in our draft Local Plan which sets out how development will be delivered in Watford up to 2036. The plan will be sent for independent assessment in the summer and we hope to have it approved next year.

# Consequences of not delivering against the target

Failure to deliver the target that's been set through an up-to-date Local Plan results in our planning powers being limited. Most of the councils in Hertfordshire do not have an updated Local Plan and so are having to approve almost all housing developments - in fact, the majority of them have approved more new homes than Watford over the last year.

#### What can the council do?

While our planning powers are already limited, once we have a

ratified Local Plan in place (we hope early next year), a number of key local issues have to be considered by a developer when a project is put forward, including:

- Is it a high-quality design?
- Does it improve the natural environment?
- Does it promote sustainable travel?
- Does it boost health and wellbeing?
- Are local historic buildings protected?
- Does it create vibrancy?

In conclusion, while I believe the target for Watford is excessive for a small borough, we have little choice but to try and deliver against it in the best possible way - promoting quality and sustainability and ensuring the right supporting infrastructure is put in place. We must not lose our ability to positively influence the growth of our town.

## Councils have limited powers

Central government implemented a National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) in 2012. If a proposed development meets the requirements of the NPPF then local councils and councillors should pass it - if they don't the developer can appeal. Councils who fail to deliver their housing targets struggle to win these appeals and can be left paying the developers' costs which can quickly mount to millions of pounds.

# Restoring Cassiobury's wetlands

Work starts this summer on the new wetlands restoration project in Cassiobury Park Nature Reserve. Its aim is to transform the area's former watercress beds into a wildlife sanctuary complete with reeds, ponds and scrapes.

The main watercress beds went out of use in the 1970s and in the early 1980s the area was fenced off as a nature reserve, which has sadly declined. The restoration will return the watercress beds to an excellent wetland habitat for birds, like the snipe and the green sandpiper, and for insects and mammals too. The project will increase the reserve's biodiversity and provide people with a large and accessible site for observing and learning about nature.

Works will include the removal of silt from the beds themselves, reopening the river inlet and clearing the flow channel and exit into the river. There will be viewing screens at intervals along the edge. The project will be led by Watford

Borough Council, with support from Friends of Cassiobury Park, Herts and Middlesex Wildlife **Trust and Community Connection** Projects CIC.

**Elected Mayor of Watford Peter** Taylor said: "This new wetland in Cassiobury Park will provide a much-needed home for wildlife and will bring back a large unused

open space for everyone to view and enjoy. The restoration will also provide educational opportunities at the reserve and will relieve flooding elsewhere in the park by restoring part of the flood plain that has been missing for some time. Projects like these help make our town a greener and more sustainable place for residents to

### Putting the wild back into **Cassiobury Park**

Watford Borough Council is embracing biodiversity with a new rewilding programme that will create beautiful wildflower meadows throughout Cassiobury Park next year.

The stunning wildflower displays, which will support our native pollinators, will take a year to establish, and by spring 2022 park-users and wildlife will be able to fully enjoy these new habitats. They will be planted with native wildflower species and managed sensitively by reducing mowing for a more naturalised landscape and to help bring the countryside back into Cassiobury Park.

Wildflower-rich meadows and grasslands are precious places for wildlife. A lifeline for bumblebees, butterflies and other pollinating insects, meadows are also a food source for seed-eating birds, offer shelter for small mammals and provide hunting grounds for bats and insect-eating birds. Sadly,

traditional wildflower meadows have vanished from much of our countryside. Nationwide, a staggering 97% of flower-rich grasslands have been lost since the 1930s.

The rewilding project is also a key part of the council's new Sustainability Strategy, with the ambitious goal to make the borough carbon neutral by 2030. The plan focuses on promoting natural solutions to climate challenges. Find out more at www.watford.gov.uk/ sustainablewatford.

# Watford's beautiful heritage buildings get a green makeover

Watford Borough Council has been awarded £3.7million of government funding to help secure the sustainable long-term future of Watford Colosseum and the Town Hall.



The money will support the installation of a range of energy efficiency measures in the 1930s Grade II listed buildings and will make an important contribution to the council's carbon neutral commitment for Watford by 2030.

The Green Grant Funding, awarded by the Secretary of State for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy as part of the Public Sector Decarbonisation Scheme, is also a significant boost to the council's Town Hall Quarter programme.

This major improvement scheme has identified the protection and enhancement of Watford's

heritage and cultural assets, which includes the Colosseum and Town Hall, as one of its top priorities.

Peter Taylor, Elected Mayor of Watford, said: "The funding we have secured will support two of our ambitions for Watford. We are committed to being a vibrant, diverse and creative town with a range of cultural venues and performances for all our community. We also recognise the vital importance of tackling climate change, protecting the environment for generations to come by achieving carbon neutral in the next decade."



# Saving residents' money whilst saving the planet

Watford Borough Council is helping residents in Leavesden Road and the Kingswood Estate to lower their bills and make a difference to carbon emissions.

By securing £2million of funding from government, the council has been able to target areas of Watford with a high proportion of energy inefficient homes compared to Watford's average. Grants go towards installing energy saving measures such as external wall, underfloor and roof insulation, as well as smart heating controls.

The project has been well received by residents in the area, with residents now starting to reap the benefits. Diana Tembo had external wall insulation installed: "It's already noticeably warmer and the heating hasn't come on at all since during the colder nights. The work has smartened up the house, replicating the brick finish to match the look of the surrounding houses. It's lovely and cosy and once it's warmed up it stays warm for a long time."

The project aims to raise EPC levels to at least a C rating for those households which have incomes of below £30,000, where improvement upgrade work will be free. The project will have a significant benefit to residents in terms of cost savings. The average utility cost over a three year period for a home with an EPC rating of C is around £2,000. This compares with an E rated home which would cost £3,500, increasing to £4,875 for an F rated property.

In every session we've run, I kid you not, there are two to three kids that I see potential in and I think could go a long way. I do see myself producing champions out of West Herts ABC but for me, a champion isn't just someone who goes on to win a world title, it ain't about how hard you hit, it's how hard you can

get hit and keep moving forward. That's a champion - somebody who sets themselves a target and reaches it. I want to make a difference and have the parents come to me and tell me it worked and they are benefitting from the sessions. This is the making of a champion.

#### You were once a pro fighter yourself. How did boxing help you in your life?

In terms of myself, life was hard. I lost my father when I was very young, I had no role model and I would often get bullied. It was really difficult and I just wanted a sense of belonging. I played a good standard of cricket and a good standard of football when I was younger, but boxing was just something else for me. You have to respect the sport of boxing, it's an art.

With that comes you looking after your health - you don't smoke, you don't drink and you don't hang around the streets as much. To divert myself away from all of this I focused on my boxing and that helped me in a positive way. It gave me self-discipline and helped me understand to be respected you need to respect others.

At West Herts ABC it's different to just your standard gyms with just a ring and some bags. We have so much engaging equipment to help people get fit that has nothing to do with punching anything! When you climb through those ropes and get in that ring,

# New contactless donation points to help raise funds for local charities

Watford residents and visitors who want to support the charities that have been helping local people survive the coronavirus pandemic now have a quick and easy way to show their support.

Watford Borough Council and Watford and Three Rivers Trust have set up two contactless tap points in the town. This includes Daisy in the Park Café in Cassiobury Park and inside Metrobank on Watford High Street, offering people a quick way to donate £3 to the Watford Covid Appeal.

The Watford Covid Appeal has already raised £170k from the generosity of residents and local businesses, with the funding distributed to over 50 local frontline charities who have been unable to undertake their normal fundraising efforts. This includes getting emergency food to those in need, supporting victims of domestic abuse and those with mental health issues, providing shelter for the homeless, care to those bereaved, advice and guidance to those who have lost their jobs and practical help to young families facing the strain of isolation.

The tap point is a pilot and, if successful, more contact points could be rolled out across other



town locations and include other fundraising efforts, such as homelessness support.

Lynne Misner CEO of Small Acts of Kindness, a charity who received funding from the appeal said: "For older people, the pandemic and particularly during lockdown has been a really lonely time.
The funding we have received

has helped us reach out to some of the most vulnerable older people locally and provide them with essential keep warm items. But most importantly, this hand-delivered gift says someone cares and is thinking about you."

# Watford's incredible vaccination effort

The efforts of Watford's local GP practices and surgeries, medical centres and the team at Watford General Hospital leading the Covid-19 vaccination programme, are all supporting the town's most vulnerable people and helping pave the way for a safer future.



**According to Department of** Health Data, as of 3 June 2021, a total of 55,220 (63%) people across Watford have received their first dose of a Covid-19 vaccine and a total of 33.864 (38%) people across Watford have received their second dose of a Covid-19 vaccine.

The Covid vaccine programme is the largest vaccination campaign in NHS history. Peter Taylor, Elected Mayor of Watford, pays tribute to Watford's vaccination team: "Practice teams across Watford have been working

tirelessly to ensure Watford's response to the vaccination programme has been a success. On top of the vaccinations, they have been undertaking their usual service to ensure that patients get the advice, tests, treatment or surgery they need.

"The vaccine rollout is instrumental in the fight against Covid-19 and there has been a great deal of coordination of manufacturing, logistics, rapid training of vaccination administration personnel and cooperation of patients. I would

like to thank the health and care workers in Watford for going above and beyond during the pandemic and encourage everyone to take up the call for the vaccine when their turn arrives."

But remember - even when you are vaccinated, it's vitally important to continue to break the chain of infection by washing our hands, using a face covering and keeping our distance from others."

**The Watford Business Growth** Grant is a new programme from Watford Borough Council and the Hertfordshire Growth **Hub, designed to support local** small businesses and help them bounce back from a bad year. To be eligible, a business simply needs to have between five and ten employees, be based in Watford, and to have been adversely affected by the pandemic.

Once a business has expressed interest in the scheme, Growth Account Managers from Hertfordshire Growth Hub work closely with them to determine their business needs and offer free, bespoke advice and support. If the business is a suitable candidate, the Growth Account Manager will also assist them in applying for a grant of between £2,000 and £5,000 to help improve operating performance and drive innovation and growth.

Grant money can be spent on consultancy services, software and important equipment, or even be used as match funding to unlock larger grants. Elected Mayor Peter Taylor hopes that the expertise and financial aid supplied by the program will be a lifeline for businesses trying to get back on their feet.

Launching the programme at Watford-based tech company Wirebox, the Mayor said; "Watford's business community is so important to the town, providing employment opportunities to residents and helping us to prosper. The past year has been



so tough for so many small companies. The Watford Business Growth Grant Scheme is our way of investing in local businesses so that they can get the support they need to succeed in the future."

The programme will remain open until all the existing funds have been allocated, or until 31 March 2022, whichever is sooner. Since launching at the end of March a large number of businesses have already applied, so it's worth applying soon if you think you might be eligible.

RefillAbell is a Zero Waste Shop that aims to eliminate plastic packaging from food and household products. The store is situated at 4 Haydon Road, Oxhey Village and will be opening in June 2021. Here, RefillAbell tell us their story...

RefillAbell is a Zero Waste Shop that aims to eliminate plastic packaging from food and household products. The store is situated at 4 Haydon Road, Oxhey Village and will be opening in June 2021. Here, they tell us their story.

The idea for RefillAbell grew out of the first lockdown, when Sameer, manager of Abell Chemist, shared his vision for a plastic free shop with Jane Hopkins. Hopkins had been helping deliver NHS prescriptions for the chemist as a volunteer. Three pop ups, countless meetings and an entire year later, RefillAbell is nearing its grand opening and our ethos of 're-use, re-purpose, reduce and upcycle' are at the core of what we are about.



At RefillAbell you will be able to bring your own containers to refill with dried food goods, such as rice, pasta, nuts, seeds, oils and a range of snacks and sweets. RefillAbell has a peanut butter machine that makes fresh, wholesome peanut butter at the press of a button.

There will also be household liquids such as laundry liquid and washing up liquid, toiletries such as shampoo, toothpaste and reusable period products. RefillAbell supports local, UK businesses and aims to have high quality products that are sustainable, fairtrade, often organic and cater for dietary requirements such as gluten free and vegans.

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### Beautiful Victorian street signs restored

To help preserve the original Victorian style of the town, Oxhey Village's Victorian cast iron street signs have been lovingly repaired and restored by Murill Construction Ltd and the council.

The restored plates reflect the history of the town and the works focused on Capell Road, Upper Paddock Road, Villiers Road, Grover Road, Aldenham and Oxhey Avenue.

- Capell Road named after The Earls of Essex and William Capell, the original owner of Cassiobury House. The plate listed as Capel Road was restored to Capell Road to reflect its origins.
- Villiers Road commemorates the relationship by marriage of the Earls of Essex and Earls of Clarendon. The family are the former owners of the land and manor house at The Grove Hotel.

• Grover Road - the Grover family owned the land on which this road was built in the 1880s, and at that date they were wine merchants in the town. Their son Henry Grover - founder of Watford FC - set up the club when he and a group of fellow teenagers were given permission by the Earl of Essex to kick a football around in Cassiobury Park.

To highlight the heritage of the town and the importance of Watford FC within the community, new commemorative artwork featuring the club's players from the 1919-1920 season has been installed at the entrance to King George V Playing Fields.

The memorial - created in partnership with the football club, Watford Borough Council and Watford Museum - features most of the Watford FC players

from that season, and was chosen as it was the team from the early years of George V's reign. The park's name originates from Britain's 60th monarch King George V, who ruled from 1910 to 1936.

The artwork also highlights the squad that played and trained across many of the town's parks and open spaces, supported by King George V and the Fields in Trust, before the club found their current home at Vicarage Road Stadium in 1922.

Elected Mayor of Watford, Peter Taylor said: "Watford Football Club has played an enormous part in our community for many years and the new entrance honours the club, the players from the 1919-1920 season and also the work of King George V in protecting parks across the UK."
